 - We are raised with Christ and glorified in Christ
 - "put to death... whatever belongs to your earthly nature."

- o [70] Common postures for "fostering discipleship" experiences
 - Assuming God is already at work
 - As learners
 - Viewing others as Christ sees them
 - Looking for the gospel to work
 - Hoping to encounter Christ
 - *NOT*...Hoping to fix something "transformation is most likely to happen when we don't have all the answers or even know what we're doing." that is, when we're out of our comfort zone
 - Which of these postures resonates with you, and why?
- [72] Discipleship Exchanges Paul's direction to "give ourselves back to God" as an offering, and to
 "make new your mind" as a shift in thinking
- [74] Salvation → Presentation → Transformation
 - Transformation doesn't occur until true presentation a blanket commitment to God
 - Breaks the cycle of choosing God based on the situation
 - What do you think about this?
- o [80] 3 Types of Community
 - Faith Community
 - Hatmaker says "the church is more open today to constructive criticism."
 - How do you find this as true or untrue today?

- Secular Community

- Hatmaker claims it's nearly impossible to make Sunday worship welcoming to those not familiar with church culture.
 - Have you seen any progress on this count?
- O When do you find it hard to choose showing up for community over just staying at home?
- o In what secular and religious community groups are you involved?
 - What are the characteristics of groups that draw you in?
- o Have you ever felt like an outsider in a group?
 - What, if anything, did you or the group do to bridge the gap?

 - Inject fun
 - Make it interactive
 - Diversify your schedule
 - Celebrate family dynamics
 - Add break-out groups
 - Increase "hang time"

- [120] "Jesus spent most of his earthly ministry trying to help the disciples reconcile two worlds: the kingdom they lived in and understood, and the kingdom of God."
 - How is Jesus still trying to do this to you today?
- [121] "Kingdom of Heaven" is at the beginning and end of The Beatitudes for the poor in spirit and the
 persecuted because of righteousness.
 - Why might Jesus have associated those two groups with ownership of the Kingdom?
- o [123] "Our idea of kingdom requires spiritual tasks; Jesus' kingdom requires spiritual surrender."
 - Why is this so hard to accept?
- o [127] Things Hatmaker has learned about the Kingdom...
 - The kingdom is more of a moment breaking through than a ladder to be climbed
 - The kingdom is a paradox (small is the new big; things we do for the sake of religion get in the way)
 - The kingdom is for sinners, not the righteous
 - The kingdom is more about letting go than holding on
 - In what ways have you let go in order to break through to the kingdom
 - The kingdom is to be pursued

 - How does our church structure get in the way?
- [146] Three categories into which you subdivide anything we do because of faith: Communion,
 Community, Commission
 - Do these three make sense? Is there anything else? *Commitment?*
 - Where does your church spend most of its time?
- o [147] ~2/3 of Americans would never attend church
 - Why?

- O What visions does the word "justice" evoke?
- O What are your expectations of a "justice"?
- Video YouTube: Justice This Is the Bible's Radical View
 - Reflections?
 - "Restorative" justice (vs. "retributive")
 - Obligation to stand up for others
 - Whom do you feel needs this the most in our current society?
 - O What can we do?
- Scripture Read Psalm 7
 - o In what ways is justice being served today? In what ways is it not?
 - o Read Micah 6:8; Luke 6:20-22;27-36
 - Greek word dikaiosune translated as "righteousness" instead of "justice"
 - More in line with restorative justice than retributive justice

- o [154] "Instead, God's justice brings healing. It's laced with a love for mercy. It sees broken things and restores them to wholeness."
 - More in line with restorative justice
- "Loving mercy and walking humbly are inextricably linked with seeking justice."
 - How successful are we at loving mercy and walking humbly when seeking justice?
 - Examples?
- Seven Steps to Seeking Justice
 - 1. View the Journey as Discipleship
 - [157] "The first step in seeking justice is to somehow stop thinking of those we are serving as the project and start thinking of ourselves as the project."
 - O How does this ring true for you?
 - "Most people I've met who are working full time in nonprofit work have been doing so either for fewer than five years or more than twenty."
 - o Why?
 - 2. Settle Your Gospel Theology
 - "holistic gospel" realizing God's redemptive plan on earth now, rather than later in heaven
 - 3. Learn to Love Mercy
 - "...our human bent to prefer physical offerings and sacrifices (or the modern-day checklist) as what we have to do to make God not mad at us."
 - O What are our modern-day physical offerings and sacrifices?
 - Need to understand and love the idea of God's mercy
 - O How are you at this?

- What is the difference between loving mercy and extending mercy? Why is it so important to start with loving mercy?
- 4. Gain a Biblical Definition of Justice
 - Tsedeq righteousness / justice
 - [163] "Biblical justice is really about righteous restoration."
 - o This is a key point in this chapter
- 5. Learn to Identify Need
 - [165] "The truth is that need is all around us. We've just conditioned ourselves not to see it."
 - O Why do we avoid identifying need around us?
 - O What are some ways we can begin to identify need in our community?
- 6. Encounter the Need
 - [166] "we always ask, 'If you had ten to fifteen people serving you in any capacity, what would it be?'"
- 7. Engage the Need in Community
 - Integration with non-faith based groups
 - "Extend dignity" "If, in how you are serving, you are extending dignity to the person you are serving, you are doing it right."
 - Have you ever witnessed service in a way that you feel it may have stripped recipients of their dignity?



- o [174] Hatmaker recalls a Texas flooding, and the volunteer organization only letting Christians serve
 - What's your reaction to this?
 - Hatmaker's aversion to matching t-shirts
 - What's the point he's driving home here?
 - Have you seen this type of server/served segregation first-hand?
- o [176] Horace Walpole "This world is a comedy to those that think, a tragedy to those that feel."
 - What did he mean?
- 1st Perspective Faith Environments "When it comes to interpreting how we apply Scripture, nothing influences us more than the faith or church environment in which we were raised."
 - Agree/disagree?
 - How much does God Himself factor into this equation?
- o [177] Be full of both grace and truth, rather than balancing them
 - Did your rearing faith environment lean more toward one or the other?
 - Truth scripture/study/obedience
 - Grace freedom/grace
 - Which comes most naturally to you now?
- o [179] 2nd Perspective Friends and Family "We are all drawn in one way or another to the idea of tribe."
 - Two negative aspects of "belonging" 1) fear of rejection & 2) hope for acceptance
 - What do you feel are the negative aspects of striving to be in the tribe?
 - Positive aspects?
 - In what ways has the desire for belonging ever influenced your believing? Did this end up having a positive or negative effect on your faith?
 - Early adopters are like pioneers heading west the crowds will come later once they see things as a bit safer
 - [181] "The key is to deeply consider...whether our stance...is truly informed and prayerful or simply a reaction to what we've experienced."
 - Look at 4 bulleted questions and consider them for LGBTQ; abortion; capital punishment
 - [195] We discussed how our early faith, friends, and family influence our spiritual perspective. Which one would you say has shaped your belief perspectives the most?
 - [195] In what ways have your perspectives changed over the years? Why? How have your perspectives stayed the same or even strengthened? Why?
- 3rd Perspective God's perspective
 - OT fear of God
 - NT God's love through Christ
 - Jesus' perspective on love
 - The Outcast (e.g., the leper)
 - The Outsider (e.g., Roman officer)
 - The Insider (Peter's mother)
